
STEWARDSHIP UPDATE: St. Luke's United Methodist Church giving campaign kicked off

Sept. 23. and culminates

Oct. 28 with Celebration Sunday. Commitment cards and letters will go out at the beginning of October.

The Stewardship Committee has 3 ASKS:

- 1. Increase the budget by 10% from \$1.2M to \$1.4M.
- 2. Fill out the commitment card.
- Turn in the commitment card on Celebration Sunday, Oct. 28 during service or anytime during the giving campaign.



Projected Funds for 2019: \$1.4M

We have some great speakers and

thought provoking activities planned to show how St. Luke's UMC is changing lives through Jesus. Here are some powerful testimonials:

- St. Luke's United Methodist Church holds space for Upon Awakening meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous 365 days per year
 has given me the opportunity to have a front row seat for countless miracles. God continues to make AMAZING things
 happen as men and women are released from the prison of alcoholism and grow in their relationship with God.
- A woman attending the Wind Crest outreach program stopped and asked if the pastor would do her memorial service,
 even if she wasn't a member of St. Luke's. She said she has a terminal diagnosis and has been given 6 months to live.
 The pastor assured her she would be honored to offer a celebration of life service when the time comes and provided
 her contact information to pass on to her daughter. Then the woman asked if she would mind visiting her at her
 apartment in the weeks to come. Our pastor explains what an honor it is to visit with her in this time of preparation
 and transition
- A woman needs surgery on her leg and will be unable to drive for at least eight weeks. She has been in a weekly Bible
 Study class that she hates to miss. Another person in the class tells her "I will pick you up each week to bring you to
 class and if I can't be there I will arrange for someone else to drive you." She never misses a class and feels grateful for
 the care and friendships.
- Families say we are showing kids from an early age that church is a good and fun place to be and that kids can make
 a difference and that has impacted them in a positive way. One mom said about the Children's Dinner Theater: "This is
 our daughter's last year to participate and she is already asking if she can volunteer to help with it next year. It's in her
 blood. We couldn't have asked for a better learning experience or our daughter over the last 5 years."
- A family expresses their appreciation for the way we are blessed during the Children's Moment. They have never listened
 to one of the children's sermons and not felt encouraged or convicted—or both. It relates to all age levels. The Children's
 Moment uses vulnerability and humor to instruct—while making certain to impart God's wisdom and truth.

Coming Down the Mountain

Our faith asks us a bigger question: Will we follow Jesus down the mountain?

What's Next in the United Methodist Church?

The United Methodist Church is the third largest Christian

denomination in the United States. Unlike many protestant denominations in the U.S., the UMC is a global denomination, with local churches in Europe, Africa, and the Philippines. Every four years, almost 1000 delegates from across the denomination gather for a business meeting – making

decisions about budget, structure, social justice issues, and beliefs. This is called General Conference. The tangible outcome of the General Conference meeting every four years is a revised and updated Book of Discipline, which contains the laws, policies, history, constitution, procedures, and tenets of our church.

Over the last few decades, the United Methodist Church has been engaged in discussions, arguments, and fights concerning homosexuality. Our current Book of Discipline has exclusionary language towards homosexuality, and there is a movement to change that language, and change current policies regarding same-gender marriage and ordination. There is also a movement to retain the language and strengthen exclusionary policies.

The denomination has come to a point where a decision must be made. In February 2019, there will be a special called session of the General Conference to debate and vote on a plan for moving forward as a church. Currently, there are four primary plans being discussed and presented to the delegates. They are called the 'One Church Plan,' the 'Traditionalist Plan,' the 'Multi-branch Plan,' and the 'Simple Plan.' Each plan focuses on different priorities – removing or reinforcing the exclusionary language, developing belief statements and punitive measures for those who don't follow that statement, allowing regional decision making based on context and culture, or creating a process for clergy and local churches to leave the denomination.

The conversations are complex in some ways and simple in other ways. The emotional depth of those conversations is profound, no matter which plan one supports. As we move closer to the General Conference in February, we'll be hosting conversations that explain the process, possible outcomes, and how this may or may not effect St. Luke's UMC.

At St. Luke's, we value each and every person, and believe that every person is a child of God, created with sacred worth as they are. We welcome all persons. Period. We also welcome the difficult conversations, and believe that together, in community, we experience and reflect God's grace and presence in powerful ways.

As the denomination engages in these difficult conversations and makes decisions for our global church, please hold the church, its leaders, and its people in your prayers. And if you have any questions about how we've come to this point and what might be next, please don't hesitate to ask.



HAAT Force Gearing Up for Cold Weather Season

HAAT Force (Homeless Awareness and Action Task Force - South Metro) provides motel vouchers to people experiencing homelessness who are disabled, a family, or expecting a baby. HAAT Force has roots at St. Luke's and we have been a long-time supporter of this 501c3. A donation of \$60 houses a family for a night. Last cold-weather season, HAAT Force provided 1258 nights of shelter to 112 individuals: 37 men, 43 women, and 32 children. Volunteers are welcome. UMCOR West Depot Experience "A Really Fun Trip"

During the week of September 10-14, our team from St. Luke's helped to inspect and repack 7,440 UMCOR hygiene kits at the



UMCOR Depot (warehouse) in Salt Lake City. These kits are sent to disaster survivors all over the country. In addition, we made quilts for people experiencing homelessness in the local community; worked alongside Mormon (LDS) people at their thrift store and worked at a Habitat for Humanity build. We brought donations to Crossroads Urban Center, a local non-profit with roots in United Methodist Women. We ate at some interesting restaurants (have you ever seen Lee Seaman try to eat a foot-tall burger?); experienced Mormon Temple Square; heard the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and their Bell Choir rehearse; visited the Utah Natural History Museum and a gorgeous botanic garden; were welcomed by the pastor at the historic First UMC; listened to a powerful organ concert in the Tabernacle; and, led by two retired United Methodist pastors, experienced beautiful devotions and a Communion service. We stayed at the lovely, cost-effective Episcopal Center of Utah. Our trip was complete when we got our colorful T-shirts, custom-printed with the motto, "When the Earth Rocks, UMCOR Rolls!" Indeed!


Fall is always an exciting time of year for the youth. Not only are they back in school, competing on all different sports and music teams, and attending

Finding Purpose in Alamosa

Labor Day weekend found a group of 14 friends from St. Luke's picking beets, visiting reptiles, camping, digging in the sand, and breaking bread together in Alamosa, Colorado. In the San Luis Valley of Southwestern Colorado, nearly 50% of the population lives well below the poverty line and relies on the food bank network organized by La Puente. St. Luke's has maintained a relationship with La Puente for a number of years having sent numerous youth mission trips to support their various efforts, as



well as several consecutive years of small groups participating in their Gleaning Program. This was the second year for a small contingent of St. Luke's families to travel south and collect fresh, ready to distribute, produce from local famers for distribution

through the food banks. Working with another group from Salida, we gathered enough beets to overflow a 15-passenger van! Following a few hours in the field, our group spent the remainder of the weekend in community with one another sharing life and thanking God for our myriad blessings. This tangible mission opportunity offered catalyst for conversation with the 8 children from our group, aged 3-10, about the importance of sharing what we have to offer – especially the impact of our time and love beyond just money.

Why Everyone is Welcome The Story of the First Methodists

Whenever we talk about the start of the Methodist Movement, we talk about the Wesley Brothers, John and Charles, and George Whitefield. They were the organizers, preachers, and hymnists who stepped into the open air and started preaching the Gospel. We often forget about the people who stood out in the open air of the Midlands of 18th century England and listened to the preaching and sang the hymns of the emerging movement. Without their presence and their enthusiastic response to John Wesley's message of God's love for all people, the movement would have died quickly and quietly. Who were these people?

England of the 18th century was changing on several fronts as the industrial revolution rapidly transformed many aspects of society. One of the things that changed was land ownership. Areas that had been occupied communally for generations were becoming titled property of the nobility. As that happened, the people who had lived there for generations were being forced off the land. They had two choices, emigrate to the New World or to the industrializing areas of the Midlands of England.

The people who went to the Midlands were forming the working class of the new industrial age. Most underwent a bewildering change to their lives. People who had lived in small villages and earned a living by farming and crafts were now living in new factory towns and working 12 hours a day and 7 days a week in the factories just to survive. Theirs was a difficult situation and very few had the skills to thrive.

The organized church was no help to them and the people in the pews of the churches wanted nothing to do with them. The theology of the church was very predeterminant. They viewed difficulties the working class were encountering as preordained. Their suffering was viewed as God's will and there was nothing to be done. They were unwanted in the churches.

As soon as word got around that John Wesley was saying that God loved these people also, he was unwelcome in the churches. He had no place to preach. Reluctantly, he stepped into the open air and preached his first open air sermon in a brickyard near Bristol. The response was incredible and word of his message spread quickly among the working class. The unwanted went to hear the unwelcome preach in the open air and the Methodist movement was born.

At St Luke's, we remember these early Methodists and we honor them. Everyone, regardless of how they look, what their faith background is, what they believe or think, or how they love, is welcome here. We remember a time when we were the unwanted and unwelcome. We welcome all and tell them, "God loves you". —Monty Hoffman

We again want to say 'Thank You!' As we shared in last month's newsletter, St. Luke's generously gave to the Ministry in Motion fundraiser and we reached our goal of \$100,000. We are so very thankful for your commitment and support of this important ministry.

Our Ministry in Motion team is hard at work determining the best option or options for a vehicle, or perhaps two vehicles. There are many decisions involved in deciding on the right vehicle – wheelchair accessible or not; one vehicle or two; bus or minivan or a combination; 24 passenger or 15 passenger; tow package or not; navigator seat or not; new or used vehicle and the price point for each; lap belts or 3-point seat belts and the additional cost and weight of those; CDL license requirement or not; do we need a new vehicle right away or can we wait seven months for a new vehicle; along with other questions being considered.

The church bus is used by a variety of ministries across the generations, and we are working hard to meet the needs of these ministries as best we can. The Board of Trustees is committed to purchasing a vehicle that is wheelchair accessible, and we hope to find the right vehicle very soon. We will keep the congregation updated on the progress, and the exciting news of a new Ministry in Motion vehicle.

Again, thank you to everyone who donated to this vital ministry – we greatly appreciate your generosity!

FROM ADDICTION AND FEAR TO **FREEDOM**

by Rev. Ryan Canaday (Ryan and his wife, Tami, are the Founders of FREE, a spiritual community for addicts, loved ones of addicts, and spiritual refugees.)



"I'm Ryan. I'm an alcoholic." These were the scariest words I ever uttered. The first time I said these

words, I did so with fear and trembling. My voice was shaky. My hands were clammy. I didn't know if I would say it when it came around to me. My head was swirling. All I could think about was: "I'm a pastor. What will people think about me? I don't want to do this. I don't want to be here. How did I get here anyway... how'd it get this bad? It was never supposed to be like this." But I said the words. I admitted it. And I felt lighter... a burden had been lifted in a way I never could have imagined.

I felt like Jacob [from the Genesis story], on the run from God, his past, himself, everything. Jacob wasn't free. But as the story progressed, he found himself in a brutal wrestling match with God. There were wounds — flesh wounds and ego wounds. There at the banks of the Jabbok River, Jacob was asked, "Who are you?" For the first time he said his own name: "I am Jacob". And it's like God said: "Good. We've got some work to do and now we can move forward."

In that moment of admitting who I was for the first time — in all the fear and unknowing — I knew what it was like to finally say "no" to shame and "yes" to a path of being free. It was like saying my name again for the first time. Thanks be to God and some friends who showed me the way out of the chaos through the 12 steps, I have been sober for more than 5.5 years. God has removed from me the obsession of the drink and I now know a new way of life. My "why", my calling, the thing that gets me

out of bed, is as clear as ever: to help others find God and beauty in the midst of mess and brokenness.

About five months ago my wife, Tami, and I started asking the question:

What would it be like to start a faith community that centers on issues of addiction and recovery? Not

to go to the inner city and start something, but to start it right here in our own

[literally], in the heart of the suburbs. We put together a leadership team of 12 people to begin the conversation of starting something new. Starting a new thing is scary. If you're passionate about it, it will always come with a bit of doubt and anxiety. It will always come with some twists and turns.

The week before our first leadership team meeting, we received dreadful news. Nick, one of the guys on our team, was 20 years old and found dead of a drug overdose early that morning. Out of the gates we had the poignant reminder that this disease is cunning, baffling, and powerful. It is relentless and always seeks to destroy life.

The need in our community **is real.** I was tired of seeing my friends die. The sub-story was growing old too: they

didn't feel like they belonged with God or the Church.

We wanted to break the silence of addiction and create space for recovery, healing, and spiritual connection. So Tami and I started FREE and we began hosting gatherings on Saturday nights in our backyard. We didn't

know who would show up or if anyone would show up. We live with that question each week. That's the reality of starting the new thing to which God is calling you. But each week FREE [in our backyard] is filled with addicts, loved ones of addicts, and spiritual refugees. We want to remind them that God loves them, God is for them, and God has not forgotten about them. During our gatherings we celebrate milestones of recovery. I teach on the stories from Scripture about a God who is filled with

> love, compassion and grace. We have storytellers that share their experiences with addiction and recovery. We have music [sometimes live, sometimes pre-recorded] - everything from Eminem to Hillsong. We pray together. And we always have coffee...lots and lots of coffee.

During these few short months of starting FREE, I have asked myself hundreds of times: Are we doing it right? Are we on the right path? Is this really making a difference?

Will we be able to fund this? Will we be able to afford the lease of that space? Every time I ask those "what if" and "are we doing it right" and "should we keep going" questions, I open up an email or a Facebook /Instagram message or a text of someone telling me they're battling addiction and barely hanging on. Or a message from someone saying: "I've been looking for a church since I got sober 18 months ago. I've tried so many churches...FREE is my church."

God keeps giving me a reason to keep saying "yes" to the path of being free, and to walk with others on this path. It's about learning to live one day at a time and trusting God in the next step, and living into the constant reminder: this journey is about progress not perfection.
