Guatemala Team Fosters Relationships

Our Pura Vida Guatemala team returned with wonderful memories of tremendous, life-impacting experiences.

Our group worked very hard to build cinderblock walls for a home for Angelica, her mother and young son, and a kitchen for Lucia and her family. We worked under the direction of the Guatemalan construction leaders and alongside the families.

Construction foremen Maco and Diego are longtime friends and it was great to connect with them again. We were also blessed by a visit from our longtime partners, Amilcar and Fausto, President and Vice President of the Board of Directors of Pura Vida in Guatemala.

At the construction site one day, Jack Ramsey was pushing a wheelbarrow full of sand down a path and he had to stop and rest. A little girl popped out from a doorway and offered him a cookie. Grace and blessing!

The house and kitchen will be completed soon by the Guatemalan workers. All of the materials and labor have been prepaid by St. Luke's donors.


Our team also visited 20 Pura Vida scholarship sponsored students! Pura Vida's primary mission is education of children in this area of the Western Highlands of Guatemala. At these individual meetings, there was so much heart-warming joy on the part of the students and their parents, as well as sponsors or their representatives. Thank you, St. Luke's for your participation in this life-changing program!

In addition, we helped distribute 611 bags of powdered milk to families in the village of Lemoa. This milk was purchased through donations to the Guatemala Milk program by St. Luke's and others. This milk provides vital nutrition to many families once a year and Pura Vida appreciates your support!

Each bag of powdered milk makes 4-1/2 gallons. One mother approached Laura Richards after receiving the milk, saying that she was so happy that her young son could have milk for dinner that night!

Some of the team, including Dr. Jim Ramsey, visited the John Wesley School, with which Pura Vida and St. Luke's have had a long term relationship. Over many years St. Luke's helped with the development of this private school, which provides a high quality education through 12th grade.

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HOLY WEEK at St. Luke's

From March 29th through April 5th, we will mark the most important time in the annual life of the church: Holy Week. These are the 8 days that will begin with Palm & Passion Sunday and will culminate with Easter. During those 8 days we gather for worship, reflection, and celebration. Each day of Holy Week is important. Each part of the story has something important to teach us. You are invited to the comprehensive experience of Holy Week, that you may experience the fullness of God's goodness in Christ Jesus.

- **On Palm & Passion Sunday**, we begin Holy Week by leaning into the story of Jesus entering into Jerusalem and creating sacred space in The Temple by flipping tables. Worship at 9:30 & 11:00am. That day we will also celebrate **Easter Fun Day** with games, snacks, and the Easter bunny from 12:30-2:30pm.
- **On Maundy Thursday**, we will worship centered around the story and sacrament of communion. And before worship, we'll gather for a simple soup dinner. Bring a soup to share if you would like. Soup at 6:00pm, worship at 7:00pm.
- **On Good Friday**, worship will be focused on music and scripture. We'll hear the story of the crucifixion from the four Gospels, and take in music that tells the story. The service will end in a powerful way, with Dr. Jim singing "Were You There" as the cross is carried out of the sanctuary. Worship at 7:00pm.
- **For Holy Saturday**, we will hold the emptiness and tension of a day when it seems that the despair of Friday will last forever.
- **On Easter morning**, we'll celebrate resurrection and the victory of life with four worship services. At 6:00am is sunrise worship outside at the church. Then at 8:00, 9:30, and 11:00am we'll worship in the sanctuary with joy that Christ is risen!



Important News from St. Luke's Letter from Rev. Calob sent March 17, 2026:

To the people of St. Luke's United Methodist Church, Greetings and peace to each of you in the name of God the Creator, Christ the Redeemer, and the Holy Spirit, our Sustainer.

On Monday, March 16 at 3:00pm, *The Denver Post* published an online article reporting that Melissa Graham, Finance Director at St. Luke's, is facing civil charges related to alleged embezzlement from a previous employer, The Montessori School of Lone Tree.

The church takes these allegations very seriously and recognizes the concern and anxiety this news may cause. The impact on St. Luke's, if any, is still unfolding. Today we began the work to hire an outside professional firm to conduct a full forensic audit. Out of an abundance of caution, Melissa has been placed on administrative leave and no longer has access to church finances, records, or the church building.

We have formed a response team to work on the next steps. This team includes me, Rev. Liza, and the chairs of the Finance, Staff Parish Relationship, Trustees, and Executive Teams. The team will share more information with the church and will seek to be as transparent as possible as things develop. If you have questions or concerns, you're invited to share those with me directly using the contact information below.

We ask for your prayers for all involved. May God grant wisdom, clarity, and peace in the days ahead.

Pentecost: A Rushing Wind



Study Leave Renewal

Dear St. Luke's, The opportunity to take time away for Study Leave this winter was a great gift. I want to share a few highlights from my month that included travel, reading, learning, rest, inspiration, and spiritual renewal.



The First Sunday of Study Leave found me attending worship at Faith United Methodist Church in St. Anthony Village, Minnesota. This is the church that nurtured me and encouraged me in many ways from my childhood until I was a young adult. That Sunday was a profound experience of homecoming and at the same time, a powerful affirmation of my call to ordained ministry in the Mountain Sky Conference of the UMC. And of course, there is nothing quite as special as sitting in church between your mom and your dad, whispering with a youth group friend in the pew ahead, and being hugged by my High School Sunday School teacher, Middle School Youth Group Leader, and almost the entire handbell choir.

The Second Sunday of Study Leave found me attending worship at Messiah Lutheran Church (ELCA) in Washburn, Wisconsin. I spent a beautiful week in the northwoods of Wisconsin, where I read, journaled, hiked along the frozen shore of Lake Superior, kept a wood fire blazing, played bingo at the Ski Hill and trivia at the brewery, spent time in a pottery studio, cross country skied, and laughed with my best friends. This was a life-giving and soul-tending week. I was so fortunate to participate in the 5th grade Sunday School class that Sunday morning, led by my best friend of 24 years, and drop a little knowledge about the Synoptic Gospels.

The Third Sunday of Study Leave found me at the Denver International Airport, waiting for a delayed flight to Savannah, Georgia. I was enroute to a weeklong conference at Epworth-by-the-Sea, a United Methodist Retreat Center on St. Simon's Island. The retreat was hosted by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center. It was a full week of important learning that I am still pondering, applying, and reflecting on. It was a gorgeous setting and I am so glad I was able to check Epworth-by-the-Sea off my bucket list (and I'd love to go back!). The retreat was attended by a lovely group of ecumenical clergy who I truly enjoyed getting to know and in fact, I am now regularly meeting over Zoom with two kindred-spirit clergywomen to continue our learning. What a blessing!

The Fourth Sunday of Study Leave found me at...Chuze Fitness in Denver! On this odd, rare free Sunday at home I wasn't sure what to do with myself. So, the gym for a workout it was! By this point in my Study Leave, I was continuing to read, pray, and journal. I had met twice with my Spiritual Director. And I was feeling a little bored. What a blessing to experience boredom - a very rare occurrence for me! It was also an indicator that I was ready to return to you, St. Luke's!

On that Next Sunday, I was greeted by so many warm hugs. It was a blessing to be missed and even more, a blessing to be welcomed home. Thank you, St. Luke's! Thank you for the opportunity to take this Study Leave. Thank you to the laity, staff, and Rev. Calob and Rev. Sallie who made everything happen as usual in my absence.

Being in ministry at St. Luke's with talented, passionate, and insightful people is an incredible gift.

The Voice of Your Soul

Early in the year, I had the joy of facilitating a wellbeing experience with a vibrant group from our St. Luke's community. As is often true when teaching, I learned a lot from the honesty and openness of the group. Our focus was on listening to the wisdom of one's inner voice as a vital pathway to trustworthy guidance.



Rather than striving to become someone new, we benefit from claiming what is already within us—innate resilience, spirituality, insight, courage and strength.

Listening with curiosity to that still, small voice within, can be a renewing practice of faith. We become more creative in our own growth and how we live life. We may find ourselves more open to solving problems and gaining insight and healing from sources we might have previously overlooked. We create space to hear the Spirit prompting us. We recognize the quiet voice of intuition and see new possibilities. This is a practice of faith I know I need. Perhaps many of us do. It feels very inviting yet not especially easy. So, I'm learning this practice through a bit more intention by walking, praying and pausing a little more often to simply listen. John O'Donohue, Celtic spiritual teacher, beautifully reflects the value of listening to the voice of the soul.

The Voice of Your Own Soul

*When you take the time to draw on your listening-
imagination, you will begin to hear this gentle voice at
the heart of your life. It is deeper and surer than all the
other voices of disappointment, unease, self-criticism and
bleakness.*

*All holiness is about learning to hear the voice of your
own soul. It is always there and the more deeply you
learn to listen, the greater surprises and discoveries that
will unfold.*

*To enter into the gentleness of your own soul changes
the tone and quality of your life. Your life is no longer
consumed by hunger for the next event, experience or
achievement. You learn to come down from the treadmill
and walk on the earth. You gain a new respect for
yourself and others and you learn to see how wonderfully
precious this one life is. You begin to see through the
enchancing veils of illusion that you had taken for reality.
You no longer squander yourself on things and situations
that deplete your essence. You know now that your true
source is not outside you. Your soul is your true source
and a new energy and passion awakens in you.*

The outdoor activities at Rosario School were wild! There were stomp rockets, jump ropes, soccer balls, beach balls and bubble wands. There was so much laughter and excitement!

We enjoyed some unique cultural experiences on the trip - shopping at the world famous Chichicastenango market, going on a tour of the cemetery and a Mayan spiritual site, and a day in Antigua.

Finance Update: Stewardship



In support of the church's fiscal year that will run from July 2026-June 2027, it is time for Stewardship at St. Luke's. This is the season when we prayerfully and intentionally consider what gift we can bring to the life and work of the church. While the practical focus is on pledging financial support for St. Luke's, it is just as important to consider the other gifts you have to give. Your presence, prayers, leadership, service, and prayer are just as needed.

Our guiding scripture for Stewardship this year is 1 Corinthians 12:4-6 from the New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition. (NRSVUE): *Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone.*

Trustees Corner: Lighting the Way Forward: Our Church's Transition to LED Lighting



Trustee Randy Larson gave an update on how the church has been reimagining energy usage at the Annual Celebration in February. He let us know that the Trustees have been working to replace old fluorescent and halogen lighting with modern LED lighting throughout our building.

This project is part of an effort to be good stewards of both our resources and the environment. The process has taken about two years and we are not quite done yet. However, we have replaced over 1,000 of the approximately 1,160 bulbs. The remaining 15% of bulbs to be replaced are in the sanctuary and in the chapel. We expect to complete those rooms in the next few months.

The switch to LED lighting reduced our energy costs from 2024 to 2025 by approximately \$4,500 or 14%. Those savings help free up funds that can be directed toward ministry, outreach, and caring for our church community.

Thank you to Randy Larson and everyone who has helped support this project.

If we have not met, come say hi!

We have made the difficult decision to cancel this year's Golf Event. No golf clubs in the area now allow shotgun starts with fewer than 100 participants, which is more than have signed up for our events in the past. Only scheduled tee times are allowed for groups our size. This would prevent the golfers from all finishing at about the same time and gathering afterwards to eat lunch and participate in the silent auction, raffle, awarding of prizes, and fellowship. We will review our options for next year and provide an update once available.

Holy Week Q&A with Dr. Jim



by Karin Wesson Jim Ramsey is always good about inspiring the choir with music selections, particularly during Christmas and Holy Week. We asked Jim some questions about this year's Holy Week music.

Q) How did you go about selecting this year's music for Holy Week?

A) JIM: After the first of the year, we discuss with clergy to see what type of experience we want to create. Some years we select a powerful musical work such as the Stabat Mater by Karl Jenkins and sometimes we put together a collection of songs or a combination of both. This year, Ken and I talked with Rev. Calob about Good Friday and we decided to go with selecting songs that will be interspersed with scripture and readings that move us all on the journey to the cross on that special night. After that is decided, we choose the songs for Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Easter.

Q) Who are your "go-to" composers, if you have them? And why?

A) JIM: Dan Forrest, Craig Courtney, Heather Sorensen and more often than not, McDonald, Hagenberg, Hayes, Goeller, and Miller. I specifically look for quality choral writing that includes inspiring moments, well crafted harmonic language, a good setting of the text and, when possible, orchestrations that enhance the choral work or anthem.

Q) What themes should the congregation be listening for?

A) JIM: Ones that connect them to their souls.


Q) How do you think music connects us to God?

A) JIM: I believe music has the power to connect us together and to God. It is often said that when one sings, you pray to God twice. Music stirs the soul and inspires our spirit in so many ways. We are blessed to have been given this gift in our lives. The most beautiful part is that music can always lead us back to God.

Advent: *Light Of The World:*

During the season of Advent, we prepared for the miracle and mystery of Christmas. Each Sunday during Advent, we lit a candle in worship for Hope, Joy, Love, and Peace. We focused on the divine light, illumination, and warmth that Jesus brings into the world. And on Christmas Eve, we lit the Christ Candle and gathered for worship through the afternoon and into the late evening. Jan. 4 brought our beloved kings procession and filled us with wonder and majesty.



You Have A Place: To start the year 2026, Sunday morning messages each focused on a different character from the Bible and how their stories teach us that we each have a place.

Mary of Nazareth (yes, that Mary) showed us that when our plans change, God is still at work. The Person With The Chariot from Acts 8 taught us that all our identities and differences have a place in God's good news. David of Bethlehem (yes, that David) demonstrated that it's ok when we need a back-up plan to the back-up plan. Peter of Galilee (yes, that Peter) taught us that whatever it is we have, it is something we can offer to God's work. The story of Ruth of Moab was about how God uses both our giving and our receiving to bless others. And to close out the series, the story of the Daughters of Zelophehad taught us that sometimes we have to assert our place in God's story.



Lent: *It's All Spiritual:* The season of Lent is a time of preparation for Holy Week. During the five Sundays of Lent (excluding Palm Sunday), we've talking about a different spiritual practice during worship.

We've talked about how we are called to fast from the things that distance us from God's goodness and to feast upon those things that are experiences of God's goodness. Generosity as a spiritual practice grounds us in God's blessings as we bless others. Mercy and justice work together in our lives and in our world. Sabbath is a spiritual practice we need in life so that we both rest and humbly leave space for the work of God. And on the final regular Sunday of Lent, we talked about the spiritual practice of prayer.




Shrek Success!


