What a joy to land in Guatemala City with a beautiful sunset greeting us. God was graciously welcoming us back! After a night in Antigua, we drove to ChiChi and began our work in the small town of Lemoa. Everyone pitched in as we began to raise the walls of this home, one cinder block at a time.

But it wasn't just a home we were building. It was a also relationship. We played with the kids, we worked alongside Isaias, we laughed with each other and we got to know the Pura Vida team as well.

We also gained great knowledge of the need for school children to have sponsors. Most children in this area quit going to school at about 12 years of age, as their parents have to pay for them to go to school after the 6th grade. Ordination Reflections

Ordination as an Elder in Full Connection in the Mountain Sky Conference of the United Methodist Church

I am so grateful for the celebratory focus that St. Luke's has shared with me regarding my ordination. I thought I would take this opportunity to share a few reflections on this process of ordination in the United Methodist Church.

A Lutheran clergy colleague in Minneapolis wrote a blessing called "For Pastors," including this excerpt:

There is a holy tension in this call to be set apart but not above, [standing shoulder-to-shoulder with the] fullness of people you are ordained to love uniquely.

They are looking for Jesus, and instead they get you, an ordinary person with sacred, restless nerve that manifests a thousand ways over time. What does 'Ordination' mean? Ordination is a sacred rite and moment of consecrating my work as a minister of word and sacrament in the life of the church. Bishop Karen Oliveto will place her hands on my head and offer a prayer inviting the presence of the Holy Spirit to be ever-present in my ministry. During the act of ordination, I accept my authority to "preach the Word of God, to administer the Holy Sacraments, and to order the life of the Church" which are the unique vows of an Elder in the UMC.

I love the phrase in the blessing (at left) that refers to the ordained as "set apart, but not above" which speaks to the gift of being called into this holy work and the reality that being ordained does not make me holier than anyone else, no less flawed or less prone to sin. I am still the same ordinary person, doing my best to direct all of us to the love of Jesus and the grace of faith.

Ordination is holy and momentous. It is not a graduation or a final achievement. Rather it is an initiation into the fullness of following God's call and a life-long vow to the ministry of the church.

A Long Process

I began the ordination process when I began my M.Div at the Iliff School of Theology in the fall of 2017. Concurrently, I formally began the process by receiving affirmation of my gifts and graces by University Park UMC where I was a member. I was in process with the DCOM (District Committee on Ministry) for two years, became a Certified Candidate for ministry in 2018, passed psychological evaluations, and began working with the Board of Ordained Ministry in 2020. I was commissioned as a provisional elder (online and then in-person in 2021). During my two years as a provisional elder, I reflected deeply on ministry, showed my effectiveness and fruitfulness as a pastor, and have been beyond grateful to be at St. Luke's during that time of growth.

What's with the Red Stole and Red Shoes?

The liturgical color of ordination is red. Just like at Pentecost, the Holy Spirit is ever-present in the moments of ordination. A red stole will be placed on my shoulders at ordination by Rev. Dr. Valerie Jackson, senior pastor at Park Hill UMC. Pastor Jackson was the pastor who baptized Ruby, she was my supervising pastor at UPark, one of my Iliff instructors, my mentor, a prophetic preacher, and a dear colleague. The stole has been beautifully crafted by St. Luke's own Jenita Rhodes who followed my every specific request. It is predominantly red but includes rainbow-colors, a sign of inclusion and the work of the Spirit.

Women ordinands traditionally wear red shoes during the service to pay homage to the theologian and scholar Georgia Harkness, who played a pivotal role in the movement that granted ordination rights to women in the UMC in 1956.

The 2023 Mountain Sky Ordination service was on Sunday, June 25 at 9:30am at First UMC Colorado Springs. St. Luke's is graciously hosting an additional ordination party on Sunday, July 9th at 10:45am.

Trustees Corner

The trustees have taken care of the two outside stages built during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The south stage, used for conducting parking lot services in 2020 through 2022, was no longer needed. Consequently, it has been dismantled; the effort was led by

Lee Seaman. Barry Curtis has re-seeded the area, and soon there will be no sign that it was ever there.



The backyard stage, used by Children's Ministry, the Performing Arts Academy, backyard worship services, and concerts since 2020, still has use for multiple groups. But the surface of the stage was made of Oriented Strand Board (since it was intended to last only a few months), and consequently has deteriorated badly. The trustees have removed the old stage surface

only a few months), and consequently has deteriorated badly. The trustees have removed the old stage surface boards and replaced them with TREX[®] decking, which is designed for outdoor use. So, this stage is now ready for use this summer for concerts, children's groups, and any other backyard events.



The trustees also hosted a very successful

Service Saturday on May 20. The ceiling light fixtures in the Fellowship Hall, Narthex, Chapel and back hallway got their annual cleaning. Many of our chairs and tables got a good scrubbing and the kitchen and Conference Room were thoroughly cleaned. One bay of the garage was straightened up and many fluorescent bulbs in the office were replaced by more energy efficient LED bulbs. Thank you for all the volunteers who helped!

All 150 Psalms generally fall into one of six categories. There are psalms that are Hymns, Songs of Lament, Royal Psalms, Thanksgiving Psalms, Wisdom Psalms, and then epic psalms of pilgrimages and legends. The 23rd Psalm is the one outlier that does not fall into one of these six. Instead, the 23rd Psalm is a "Psalm of Confidence" with an overarching motif of trust.

brushing teeth, and where children even have the opportunity to learn how to use computers.

Pura Vida has a special relationship with the school in Lemoa that they helped build, and we got to visit the Rosario School for a special morning presentation with the children where we were all invited onto the stage for a song and dance! The energy and



the love was great. We then broke up into groups, meeting with them in their classrooms and playing with them in the outdoor common area.

When we finally had to leave Lemoa to return home, we had Juana and Isaias' home about halfway built. It was a joy to bless their family and their new home, but it was hard to leave. Our friends in Guatemala will forever be in our hearts and prayers. It truly was a lifechanging trip.

Synopsis of Descendant, directed by Margaret Brown - In 1860 an Alabama planter and slave holder, Timothy Meaher, made a bet that he could import enslaved Africans to Alabama, even though the international slave trade had been outlawed since 1801. He succeeded in transporting 110 enslaved Africans aboard the ship Clotilda, offloading them along the Mobile River and burning and sinking the ship. Today the descendants of those enslaved Africans continue to live in Africatown, a suburb of Mobile, sharing the story of the crime that was committed against them. The Meaher family also continue to live in Mobile, thriving on the generational wealth that slavery provided. Film director Margaret Brown has created a beautiful film, documenting the voices, the lives, and the stories of the Clotilda descendants. We hope you will join us!

Brave Spaces Legislative Advocacy - Lobby Day at the Capitol

Our Brave Spaces Legislative Advocacy team remained active through the end of the 2023 Colorado General Assembly on May 8. We prioritized 10 bills representing racial/social justice issues in Immigration, Affordable Housing, Climate, Criminal Justice, and Gun Violence Prevention. At the end of the session, eight of these bills have moved forward, although with some significant changes. We continue to learn about the legislative process and how to advocate effectively for racial justice in Colorado.We participated in Together Colorado's Faith and Justice Lobby Day at the Capitol, and we attended House and Senate Committee hearings to show our support. We also sent emails to our respective legislators and to Governor Polis to urge their support for our priority bills.We'll continue to look for opportunities to influence the passage of racial equity bills in 2024.

March - Our St. Luke's hikers dusted off their boots and set out for a splendid day of early spring hiking at Dawson Butte in late March. It was a brisk, but sunny day and we had the trails almost to ourselves. Jane Staller shared the history of the 1965 flood in the Denver area that started at Dawson Butte when 14

I would highly recommend this series. The study encompassed the connection between the American church and racism throughout our history up to the present time. In sharing our responses to his reflective questions each week, the facilitators provided a sacred space to listen to each other and keep it real. This study continues to affirm the importance of doing this work in community and supporting each other wherever we are on this journey. I am also learning to listen to my resistance and having my perspective of our history and connection to current events unraveled and expanded.

Annual Conference 2023 - A Lay perspective

by Susan McIntosh Annual Conference in the United Methodist Church is like a giant family reunion. There are people that I only see at conference, and, after a three-year hiatus, this year was extra special. The Mountain Sky Annual Conference is the annual gathering for the pastors, ministers, and laity of the church in the states of Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, and Montana (and one church in Idaho, because it's easier to get there from Montana

than from the rest of Idaho). According to the conference web site "The conference is composed of 374 churches with nearly 70,000 members across 460,000 square miles." All those pastors and ministers, and the staff of the Conference and the Districts that support the local churches, and an equal number of lay members, meet annually to do the business of the church. The theme this year was "Give Me Your Hand." On the Annual Conference page, we are reminded that it is a time to "Gather, Acknowledge, Honor, Celebrate, and Unite." And we did all that, through worship, business, and fun. We gather to reconnect, to re-energize, and to re-engage with each other.


This year, many attended the sessions virtually, and there were others who just weren't available, so we had around 250 or so attending in person at First UMC in Colorado Springs. We set salaries and benefits, adjusted the internal organization of the conference, and recommended polity changes to the General Conference - the global gathering that generally happens every four years.

The Reverend Janet Wolf joined us as a guest preacher. She walked us through various scriptural passages, and talked about the radicality of the Bible, the presence of heaven here and now, and how change that is happening now shows

us those small splatterings of heaven here among us. Like at a family reunion, where you tell stories or share hugs or remember those who aren't with you, we commemorate endings. We held a memorial service, acknowledging the pastors and their spouses who passed away. We also recognized the pastors who are (or have) retired. We sang. And we prayed - for each other, for friends, for sanctuaries that had been vandalized, for friends who had committed suicide. We prayed as we lifted up each of the 40 churches that left the United Methodist Church through disaffiliation, and for the many churches that closed. As part of the General Conference delegation, I stood to be recognized for that, and the lead delegates reported on how General Conference 2020 will now be held in 2024 (but is still called "General Conference 2020"). There's a lot of detail here. I'm happy to chat more about it if you're interested.

That sounds like a lot for two and a half days! But there's more! Throughout, we learned of various missions and programs that are part of the Annual Conference, and supported those with offerings, and we held our annual "Tug o Love" fundraiser - supporting Family Promise of Colorado Springs and East Angola Pastors.

And on Sunday we celebrated ordination! It was wonderful to be able to stand while Liza was blessed, and to celebrate with her when she received her stole.
