Advent: A Season of Preparation

Friends, the holiday season is here! This is a special time in our culture when so much takes place. We gather with family and friends. There are special meals and treats. Opportunities to serve and volunteer abound. Decorations are hung in our homes, our communities, and in the church. Traditions both new and old fill our schedules.

Rev. Calob Rundell Lead Minister In the life of the church, we call his special season Advent. Beginning on December 1st, we are invited into a sacred time when we prepare our hearts, our souls, and our minds to encounter Christ Jesus in the Christmas story. Advent is a season when we sing special

songs, engage in prayer, spend time in fellowship with each other, and engage with scripture. To help make this Advent season meaningful, I am inviting you to be a part of a special Bible study opportunity known as The Advent Challenge.

The Advent Challenge is simple: read one chapter of the Gospel of Luke each day in December. There are 24 chapters in Luke. By the time we arrive at December 25th, you will have read the story of Jesus and be better prepared to encounter Him on Christmas. You can use any version or style of the Bible that speaks to you. If you miss a day or a week, it is easy to get caught up.

To help in our reading of Luke together, there will be short study videos for each chapter. You can find these videos on the church's social media channels, Facebook and Instagram, starting with an introduction video on November 30th. These videos will each be approximately 10 minutes each, and will discuss things like background context, history, characters, and major themes from each chapter.



I want to personally invite everyone that is a part of St. Luke's

to engage in The Advent Challenge. It is easy in the holiday season to get caught up in the busyness and the hustle. But in the midst of it all, Jesus still shows up in the manger of Bethlehem. This Advent, let's get to know Jesus better. Let's intentionally make time for the story of Jesus this December as we get ready for all that Christmas holds.

I believe that engaging with the birth, life, death, resurrection, and teachings of Jesus is especially important this Advent season. We live in a divisive and tumultuous time in our country and in our world. If we are going to be the St. Luke's that our community needs us to be, we need Jesus. If we are going to be a voice for justice and liberation, we need Jesus. If we are going to be a church that cares for everyone, especially those that our wider politics and culture dismiss, we need Jesus.

This Advent season, let's encounter Jesus together, Rev. Calob

Honest Advent

Have you watched the recent Netflix documentary "Martha"? It is an enlightening look at the life and influence of Martha Stewart, lifting the veil on her drive for success at the detriment of personal relationships. I was struck by the use of the word "perfect" in the first half of the documentary. I suppose it is no shock that Martha Stewart's home and lifestyle empire was built around the perception that perfection is a) obtainable

and b) what we are all striving for (at least as far as homes, gardens, wardrobes, and recipes are concerned).

I will confess I am guilty of longing for a Martha Stewart level of perfection in my home, especially at Christmas. I set impossible standards of what I hope to accomplish in these short days leading up to Christmas. The perfect gifts, the perfect decor, the perfect sermon, the perfect sugar cookie, the perfect pine tree lit in the corner of our living room.

Every year the same guilt and stress meets me when I am unable to meet those goals. As we enter the season of Advent, a time of hope and waiting, it is important to re-center our ideals of why we are striving for perfection in an unperfect world.

As we contemplate on an Honest Advent this season, I hope we can all release our impossible standards for the errands and tasks in front of us and instead find assurance that in every aspect of the Christmas narrative in scripture, humility, mess, fear, struggle, love, hope, and peace win out over perfection every time.

In the beloved book, The Best Christmas Pageant Ever by Barbara Robinson, we find a reminder of the unexpected truth when "perfect" does not happen. The story follows the Herdman children, known as the town's troublemakers, who end up taking over the church's annual Christmas pageant. Despite their rough edges and unconventional ways, the Herdmans bring a raw honesty to the story of Jesus' birth that touches the hearts of everyone involved. As one character reflects, "It's the best Christmas pageant ever!" because it was real, messy, and filled with genuine feeling.

I am always reminded at this time that a God who came to earth, to live with us and love us, is never asking for perfection. So, I as relinquish my own standards of perfection for this holiday season, I pray that we all strive for moments of hope and peace in whatever forms they present themselves.

We are filled with gratitude for the installation of new sanctuary carpet, the many generous donations that contributed toward the project, the many hands that helped move and reset chairs, and the amazing installers that completed the work quickly, despite the snowy weather!

The new carpet was installed in the sanctuary, including the chancel area, the choir loft, and the platforms. The carpet extends through the hallway behind the sanctuary and the north stairs leading downstairs.

This carpet project came to fruition following the Future's Task Force report which identified care and visible improvements to our building as a priority. Thanks to gifts from anonymous donors, we were able to launch a Matching Challenge in September. The initial gifts of \$16,000 were quickly and generously matched by our congregation. Funds exceeding the cost of the carpet have been designated in the Building Improvement Fund and will be used for upcoming capital improvements.

Trustees Corner


The Trustees completed a two year project to replace the fluorescent bulbs in all the ceiling fixtures in our building. We conducted an energy audit in 2022; it pointed out that one of

the biggest energy savings we could implement would be replacing all our fluorescent bulbs with LED bulbs. Since then, we have replaced about 900 bulbs, thanks to the ongoing efforts of John Church, Randy Larson, Sam Burget, and Ken Fong. We estimate this saves us about 10% of our electrical energy usage.

The next phase of this project is replacing the fluorescent bulbs

in the Sanctuary, Narthex and Fellowship Hall. Some initial progress has been made, thanks to Tim Boles, but this project will take a while, since a lift or scaffolding is required.

Members of Common Thread have been generously donating items needed by Giving Heart and HAAT Force to help people experiencing homelessness. In addition, they will be providing items for the March 2025 Guatemala Team to host a fun visit to a local school in the Western Highlands of Guatemala. St. Luke's Feeding of the 5000 Community Food Drive was in full swing again this year from

October 4-6. With 10 King Soopers stores participating on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday; our community far exceeded last year's mark, donating 28,183 pounds of food valued at over \$54,675.02 as well as cash donations! The Feeding of the 5K race raised an additional \$1,234.75 totaling an incredible \$55,909.77 for the Food Exchange Resource Network (FERN). 84 volunteers did all this work across 142 volunteer spots.



FERN is a food resource collaborative that serves an estimated 1000 families each week. Feeding of the 5000 has a long history at St. Luke's, and is a premier food drive in the South Metro area. Each year this food drive sees dozens of committed volunteers work hard all weekend to alleviate food insecurity. We are grateful to everyone from St. Luke's who donated their time to volunteer at store fronts, drive the pick-up vehicles, sort, pack the donations at St. Luke's, and deliver them to FERN. And of course, we're grateful to everyone who contributed food and cash! See you again next year.

Giving Tree: It's that time of year again when members of St. Luke's descend upon a Christmas tree full of tags! The Giving Tree went up in the Fellowship Hall on November 10th. For the first phase of the Giving Tree, St. Luke's once again partnered with Florence Crittenton Services. Serving Denver since 1893, Florence



Crittenton is a Denver non-profit that educates, prepares, and empowers teen moms and their children through education, health and wellness, postsecondary preparedness, and basic/ emergency needs support. Due to the overwhelming generosity of the congregation last year, we increased the ornaments from fifty to sixty-five to hang on the tree and once again

and snatched up all 65 ornaments were snatched up. One could choose to purchase gifts for a teen mom or a child, whose ages ranged from newborn through 6 years. The ask for a mom was a gift card to a store of their choice. There were three items to buy for each child, a requested toy, an item of clothing, and underwear or diapers. Gifts will be delivered to Florence Crittenton on December 6th and distributed to families at the start of their winter break.

After the tree was picked bare during phase one of the Giving Tree, it was replenished with tags for various mission projects to support. In lieu of a gift for a loved one, church members can select one of the tags from the tree to donate to one of these worthy projects. Supported missions include Giving Heart, Pura Vida Construction Projects, Guatemala Milk Program, Christmas in the Park, HAAT Force, Honduras Abundant Life Christian School, Warren Village, and Field Elementary. 

BRAVE SPACES: Be Here, Be You,

Belong! UMC Social Justice Principles Our CSE Brave Spaces Team joined with St. Luke's member Susan McIntosh, newly elected Lay Leader to the Mountain Sky Conference, in October to create conversation around the mission and ministry of these crucial principles that encourage us to fully live our Micah 6:8 commitment: To act justly, to love kindness and to



walk humbly with our God. With 30 people present, our conversation was engaging as we shared questions and made commitments to further action toward justice, putting our beliefs into action and fully living our values. The UMC Social Principles have long been foundational to our church. They are truly in the DNA of St. Luke's!

St. Luke's Brave Spaces group joined our friends and partners at Montview Boulevard Presbyterian Church for their fall series on White Christian Nationalism.

In September we heard Rev. Amanda Henderson address the threat of White Christian Nationalism. Rev. Henderson, who is the Director of the Institute for Religion, Politics, and Culture at the Iliff School of Theology, discussed the long, evolutionary history of the fusion of Christianity with aggressive political movements in the United States and the resulting threat to American democracy. She encouraged churches to include conversations about the threat to Christianity posed by Christian Nationalism.

In October, we returned to Montview for a presentation by Rev. Dr. Jemar Tisby, author of The Color of Compromise and How to Fight Racism. Dr. Tisby expanded the discussion of Christian Nationalism, encouraging Christians to draw a clear distinction between the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the rhetoric of Christian Nationalism.


