Outperforming Expectations

The annual Feeding of the 5000 Community Food Drive at St. Luke's returned October 3–5, 2025, surpassing last year's totals and

strengthening partnerships across the South Metro area. This year, St. Luke's joined forces with St. Andrew and the local LDS Stake, expanding volunteer involvement and community reach.

Eight King Soopers locations participated throughout the weekend, helping generate 34,555 pounds of

donated food—exceeding last year's record—as well as more than \$9,000 in cash contributions. In addition, the annual Feeding of the 5K run/walk raised another \$1,900 in support of the Food Exchange Resource Network (FERN).

All food donations were shared between FERN

and the St. Andrew's Market. FERN, a collaborative food resource network, provides support to an estimated 1,000 families each week, making these contributions especially meaningful. The Feeding of the 5000 drive has a long history at St. Luke's and remains one of the South Metro area's premier food donation events. Each year, dozens of dedicated volunteers give their time to staff storefront collection sites, drive pick-up vehicles, sort and pack donations at St. Luke's, and deliver goods to FERN.

Organizers extended heartfelt thanks to every volunteer and donor who made this year's event a success. We give a special shout out to the Preble family who make the Feeding of the 5000 happen and put in countless hours. "Because of the generosity and hard work of our community, thousands of families will receive the food support they need," organizers said. "We are grateful for everyone who contributed—see you again next year."

Study Leave January 2026 - Q&A

Dear St. Luke's,

With much excitement and gratitude, I want to share that I have been approved for a month-long study leave in early 2026! As I have planned and prepared for this opportunity, and discussed the possibility with staff and leadership teams at St. Luke's, a common set of questions



have surfaced so I thought it would be fun to share more about this study leave in a FAQ-style format!

Q: What is Study Leave? A: Every four years, up to four weeks of study leave are available for full-time clergy serving under the same appointment. This guideline falls under Clergy Support and Continuing Education in the policies and procedures of the Mountain Sky Annual Conference, and is not considered vacation time.

Q: What was the approval process? A: I first mentioned the possibility to Rev. Calob who offered his unwavering support. In August, I presented my proposal and syllabus for a potential study leave to our Staff Parish Relations Team (SPRT) who voted unanimously in approval. That proposal was submitted to our District Superintendent, Rev. Jessica Rooks, who gave the final sign-off. (Oh, of course Denton also gave his approval since my syllabus includes some travel away from home!)

Q: Why now? A: As I said, clergy are eligible for study leave every four years. I have had the honor of serving St. Luke's for five-and-a-half years! Since 2020, ministry has been fun, challenging, life-giving, soul-filling, and fast-paced! I feel a tug to recenter my soul and spiritual practices, remember my call to ministry, and renew my mind, body, and soul for the next five-and-a-half years of ministry.

Q: What are you going to study? A: In the syllabus I created, I have a different focus for each week of the leave.

WEEK I - Rest and Reflect: This week, I will intentionally reflect on the last 5 years and review where there have been successes and where there have been missteps. I will return to the important readings that influenced me in seminary and at different points in my journey of spiritual formation. For this week, I will travel to Minnesota and Wisconsin for a personal retreat and time to reconnect with my roots.

WEEK 2 - Imagine and Investigate: My goal for this week is to dive into a handful of books, podcasts, and webinars that I have bookmarked as "when I have time." I never have time! Many of these resources share the topic of leadership, innovation in ministry, and generational studies.

WEEK 3 - Prioritize Peace: Thanks to a grant from the conference Ministerial Education Fund, I will travel to St. Simon's Island, GA and attend a 5-day clergy retreat led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center on the topics of Family Systems, Conflict Transformation, and Reconciliation Practices. This is a retreat that has been on my bucket list for several years and I am looking forward to the experience.



WEEK 4 - Inspire and Integrate: Following the retreat, I will be intentional about planning for the integration of ideas into my daily spiritual practices and ministry at St. Luke's! I have additional items on my reading list for this time and I am sure there will be follow-up reading from the retreat that I will want to review while it is fresh.

Q: What are the dates? A: The leave begins on Wednesday, January 7. My first Sunday back leading worship will be February 8 and I will be back to my regular schedule then.

Q: How can we reach you during your Study Leave? A: Great question! My intention is that you will not have reason to! My areas of ministry will continue to be led by the lay leaders who are in leadership roles: SOUL Ministry, Prayer Team, Friday Bible Study, and Pub Theology. Our incredible clergy team and staff will handle care needs and anything else that may arise and will be in touch with me, if needed.

Thanks, St. Luke's! As always, I appreciate this supportive and loving community that cares for our clergy and staff. I can't wait to share the new and inspiring things I will learn during this time.

Quilts of Valor: Janet Fethke & Bob West

Quilt of Valor Recipient - Janet Fethke: After completing nursing school in 1964,



Janet felt called to serve her country after a recruiter visited her graduating class. Alongside her roommate, she decided that joining the military "sounded like a good idea"—a choice that would shape her life. She entered the United States Air Force and began a career of service that lasted four and a half years. Stationed first in Biloxi, Mississippi, she not only fulfilled her duties as a nurse but also met Bill Fethke, the man who would become her husband. Later, her service took her overseas to Tokyo, Japan, where her family grew with the birth of a daughter. After leaving the Air Force,

she continued her vocation by working as a school nurse in several elementary schools. She helped raise three grandchildren, two of whom lived with her for most of their childhoods. Her home has always been a place of stability, love, and guidance. St. Luke's has been grateful for the leadership and support of Janet and Bill Fethke and their family for well over 30 years. Our Music and Arts Ministry has greatly benefitted from this veteran and her family.

Quilt of Valor Recipient - Bob West: First Lieutenant Bob West served in the United States Army from 1966 to 1968, entering through ROTC at Mississippi State University. Choosing to volunteer rather than be drafted, he embraced the discipline and honor of military service during a pivotal time in history. His training began at Aberdeen,

Maryland, followed by Fort Lee, Virginia, where he joined a class of 100 officers preparing for assignments. Though Vietnam was a possibility, his path led him to the New Cumberland Army Depot in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. There, he worked in the International Logistics Center, overseeing shipments,



making important connections, and ensuring supplies reached their destinations around the world. After his discharge, he returned to Mississippi State to earn his master's degree, completed reserve duty, and eventually moved to Colorado. He built a successful 30-year career in insurance while continuing to live out the values of discipline, honor, and service instilled by the Army. At St. Luke's, we are blessed to have not only his presence in the choir, as well as his reliable volunteer work at Love Inc, but his steady leadership as a Stephen Ministry leader for many years and now a SOUL Minister.

Journeys of Hope: Exodus

During the month of September, Sunday morning messages during worship focused on the story of Exodus. We followed along as God spoke to Moses out of a burning bush and told him to



go to Egypt and tell Pharoah to let the people go. We then traveled with the people out into the wilderness on a roundabout way. And then we commiserated with the people as they asked "Is The Lord among us or not?" God responded with food and water to assure the people The Lord was indeed with them, as God assures us that God is with us.

Journeys of Hope: People and The Land In October, we focused Sunday morning messages on the story of who gets to live where. This month we were particularly sensitive to



the history of native peoples and the loss of land. Rev. Matt Franks, lead minister of Castle Rock United Methodist Church, joined us as a guest preacher on October 12th. Rev. Franks is a member of the Cherokee Nation with Sac and Fox heritage.

Sacred and Holy Moments

November is a month of tradition during Sunday morning worship at St. Luke's. The four Sunday of November each have their own theme that makes each sacred (The fifth Sunday of November is part of the season



of Advent.) On the first Sunday, we marked All Saints Day when we remember loved ones who have passed from this life to the life eternal. This service was marked with special music, candle lighting, and a special sung communion liturgy from Dr. Jim and Rev. Sallie. The second Sunday was Veterans' Sunday, where we presented two quilts of valor and had special music from the kids choir. The third Sunday started a new tradition at St. Luke's: Christ The King Sunday. This is a day when we seek to understand what it means to follow Jesus and seek the Kingdom of God that is so different than our worldly kingdoms. The month concludes with Thanksgiving Sunday when we express gratitude.

Guatemala March 2026 - Burritos, Milk and Scholarships

Our team from St. Luke's is getting ready for our March 2026 trip to Guatemala through Pura Vida. The entire congregation is part of this mission! The team's primary focus will be fostering our relationships with friends, partners and families in Guatemala.

While in Guatemala, we will be doing the following:

- Helping with home construction for families in great need. These homes provide safety and dignity for our brothers and sisters in the Western Highlands of Guatemala. Our recipient families this year are Lucia, with children ages 22, 15,13, 11 and 9 and Angelica, with son aged 4 (see photo). To help raise funds for home construction, we will again be selling homemade burritos! We will be taking pre-paid orders after worship services and online. Burritos can be picked up on January 4, Three Kings Sunday.
- Helping with the distribution of the annual Guatemala Christmas Milk. Every year, St.Luke's collects donations to purchase
 bags or canisters of powdered milk, each of which makes 5 gallons of milk for a family. This helps provide months of vital
 nutrition to chronically malnourished children. Milk is not commonly available in the Western Highlands due to the
 expense. You can donate to the Christmas Milk on our St. Luke's December Giving Tree.
- Visiting Pura Vida Scholarship Students. Pura Vida's primary mission is education of children and youth. Through Pura Vida's tremendously life-impacting Student Scholarship Program, we are provided the opportunity to financially support (sponsor) students so they can get an education, from grade school through high school and even beyond. It costs \$48 a month for K-12 students. Student sponsors are greatly impacted by the relationships that they enjoy with their students. 
15-Year Anniversary Thanks!

CSE Fall Recaps

Peaceful & Bright CSE hosted a beautiful evening on Dec. 9 to help center us during the busy Christmas season. The peace and light of the chapel, the welcoming decor, the delicious homemade cookies, the meaningful readings that reflected the many emotions of this season, and the lovely and transcendent holiday music from Sandy Larson on the piano brought both depth and lightness connecting every part of the evening.

Sand Creek Spiritual Healing Run

The annual Healing Run commemorates the Sand Creek Massacre and provides spiritual healing for the Cheyenne and Arapaho people and their allies by following the route of the attacking soldiers from the massacre site to Denver. The Brave Spaces team in partnership with our St. Luke's community contributed over \$1500 to help sponsor Native American elders and descendants who participated in the run. Our team also had the meaningful experience of preparing and helping to serve breakfast to the runners and support team on Sunday morning, Oct. 26. Following the breakfast, we gathered at the Capitol to witness the closing ceremony and to hear the music, history, vision and prayers offered by elders and descendants.

Fall Cultural Adventures

Eight of us enjoyed lunch at Haveli Indian restaurant in September. October's



Cultural Adventure was an unplanned tie-in to the sermon series *People & The Land*. We met at the American Museum of Western Art and participated in an engaging tour led by a passionate volunteer who helped us look for the historic significance, cultural practices, and emotional depth in day-to-day western life, Native American life, and landscape. November brought a time of great conversation and incredible food as we tried the Sahara Moroccan restaurant which has been in the Centennial area for thirty years.

Relationship Enrichment

Thanks to Carl Cleveland for leading another session of this wellbeing class this fall. Carl guided participants in a 4-week course leveraging his 20 years of family and workplace systems expertise. Attendees explored how to create more purposeful relationships for family, friends and the workplace through a myriad of topics. The class covered the impact our family of origin, birth order, personality type can have on how we relate to others, and how to maintain healthy boundaries to foster positive connection.

Fall Yoga Our fall yoga sessions with Sharon were sacred times with a focus on renewal, rejuvenation, hope, letting go, and gratitude. Sharon begins every session with a beautiful theme and devotion. We all loved some of the new background music she played featuring Native American flute music which was inspired by the church's focus on Indigenous People. One new participant remarked "I've never had a yoga session quiet my soul—in addition to getting the kinks out." We are all so grateful for these continued classes and the time to build community. cont. on pg. 10

Brave Spaces What Can I Do? Series - Wow!

CSE's first 3 sessions of the *What Can I Do* series exploring current issues that are part of our United Methodist Social Principles were covered in previous issues of *The Chronicle* this year and they included Immigration, LGBTQIA+, and Church & Government and our last 3 topics are covered below. Brave Spaces had an informative, inspiring, and active 2025!

Homelessness - Our Neighbors in Crisis: We launched our month-long focus on Homelessness on September 8 with an excellent panel that included Tiffany Marssitto and Deputy Mike from Douglas County's HEART program, Tammy Slipher,

an outstanding advocate for our unhoused neighbors with leadership roles at Change the Trend, Arapahoe County Food Security Coalition, and HAAT Force. Our featured speaker



was Tonya Rodriguez, who shared her experiences of being unhoused and the sources of support she has uncovered. We also learned about some of the Myths about homelessness. We distributed a Resource Guide for more Learning and Action. We also included two "field trips" to local organizations that serve our unhoused neighbors and offer volunteer opportunities, and a documentary screening.

- Bridge House Sept. 18: We visited Bridge House, a holistic "Ready to Work" program that includes paid transitional work, housing, and case management over a 9-to-12-month period for adults experiencing homelessness. CEO Melissa Arguello-Green explained the program and gave us a tour of their new facility in Englewood.
- Giving Heart & HAAT Force Sept. 25: We provided lunch for guests of Giving Heart,
 a faith-based, drop-in resource center that serves individuals experiencing homelessness.
 Giving Heart provides essential resources, community, and support services. We also
 visited HAAT Force, which provides severe weather motel vouchers, resource navigation,
 and case management for people experiencing homelessness.
- Beyond the Bridge Oct. 29: The Brave Spaces Team sponsored a special showing of the documentary film, Beyond the Bridge. Over 90 community members attended, representing at least seven different faith communities, and three counties, and included elected officials and representatives from numerous nonprofits that serve our homeless community. After viewing the film that offered various solutions to homelessness, we broke into small groups to have serious conversations about what could work for us in our communities and the importance of collaboration.

The Land Tells the Story - Indigenous Peoples: October was filled with opportunities to commemorate Indigenous Peoples and particularly their relationship to the land. Rev. Dr. Janet Forbes shared her knowledge and personal stories of the indigenous peoples of the Rocky Mountain Region and explained how Methodists were involved in the tragedy of the Sand Creek Massacre. Rev. Calob Rundell talked about growing up and living on the land near the Sand Creek Massacre site and how this shaped his experience of native peoples. This session

inspired our Outdoor Adventures team to offer a hike at Fox Run Regional Park to view the Ute Indian Prayer Trees. Rev. Janet shared the history and stories of these trees "culturally modified" by the Ute for navigational, burial, and spiritual purposes.

Environmental Stewardship - Points of Light: St. Luke's Creation Care team hosted our final session on Nov. 3rd. The program continued our exploration of the UMC Social Principles, this time focusing on caring for creation. People in our own St. Luke's community have created many points of light in caring for creation, and new opportunities continue to unfold. Our guest speakers, all members of St. Luke's, shared their unique stories and gifts to our St Luke's community. Ryan Rairigh helped lead the effort to secure St. Luke's commitment and funding for solar panels. Cathy Collins, an environmental engineer, has invested her professional expertise in many ways to support St. Luke's environmental programs. Alan Babcock was instrumental in building We Don't Waste to promote food equity in the Denver Metro area. Nichole Rairigh is a master gardener, who has a passion for teaching others about environmental stewardship. Bob Oliver educates people about food choices that promote the wellbeing of creation. Caroline Merchant is a creative environmental steward who practices and teaches others about recycling and composting strategies that make a big difference. Debbie Miller is a leader with Renewed Treasures, a ministry that supports people and the environment. Susan McIntosh serves with the Mt. Sky Conference to foster transformative change grounded in our UMC Social Principles. The program concluded with Dr. Jane Goodall's final message to the world, emphasizing individual action as a source of hope.



Little School was full of energy as we welcomed the harvest season and the season of light! This year, we are once again honored Native American Heritage Month by



project that will place a solar array on our south-facing roof, reduce our carbon footprint, and lower our electric costs over time. At our Church Conference on Oct. 19, attendees voted unanimously to approve the project—a powerful expression of shared commitment and hope. Thanks to your generosity, we have already exceeded our initial \$250,000 fundraising goal, with more than \$255,000 donated and pledged. We've signed our contract with LIV Solar to do the installation and are now completing the process for a \$250,000 loan. Installation is scheduled to be completed before July, helping us live out our call to care for God's creation and support our ministries for years to come. Thank you for your support!
