Becoming a Lifeline Mental Health First Aid Workshop





On a Saturday in early November, we filled the Chapel with people who held a deep hope and commitment to become a lifeline to people in their families, neighborhoods, places of work,

and community. The shared desire of all in attendance was to make a difference and to respond in an informed and compassionate way to the needs of those who struggle with mental health concerns.



Thanks to the leadership of our Stephen Ministers and a partnership with Centura Health and Littleton Adventist Hospital, over 30 people completed the Mental Health First Aid Certification workshop. And, due to much interest within our community, we intend to offer additional training opportunities in early 2018 for youth and for adults. If you would like me

Our professional facilitators encouraged everyone to remember the following Mental Health First Aid Action Plan when responding to a person struggling with a mental health challenge:

- I. Assess for risk of suicide or harm.
- 2. Listen nonjudgementally.
- 3. Give reassurance and information.
- 4. Encourage appropriate professional help.
- 5. Encourage self-help and other support strategies.

An immediate support is Colorado Crisis Services. They provide confidential help for any mental health, substance use, or emotional crisis 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

The number is 1-844-493-8255. You may also text "talk" to 38255 or go online to coloradocrisisservices.org. Professional counselors are available to assist individuals dealing with a crisis or friends/family members who are supporting a someone experiencing a mental health, substance use or emotional crisis. Crisis can take many forms - depression, family crisis, anxiety, substance abuse, relationship problems, bullying, etc.

- A live church has parking problems; a dead church does not.
- A live church has lots of "noisy" children, even in worship; a dead church is fairly quiet.
- A live church often changes the way it does things; a dead church does not change anything.

A few weeks ago I shared the following illustration

in a sermon about what it means to be a thriving

That illustration is here:

church versus dying church.

- A live church dreams great dreams for God's kingdom; a dead church has nightmares.
- A live church grows too fast to remember everyone's name. In a dead church, everyone has known everyone else's name for years.
- A live church forgives and seeks forgiveness; a dead church never makes any mistakes.
- A live church supports its budget; a dead church supports pet projects.
- A live church sees challenges and opportunities; a dead church sees problems and obstacles.
- A live church worships; a dead church worries.

A few days after using this illustration, I came across an article titled, "Does Your Faith Community Live out of Memory or Imagination?" by Bill Wilson, writing for the Lewis Center for Church Development. As you might guess from the title, the article addressed the common practice among churches to function as they always have. There is a phrase we call the seven last words of a church – "we've never done it that way before."

Churches, like individuals and families, form routines and comfort zones. We remember back to when a certain program was the most successful, and attempt to re-create that environment. We get comfortable with what is familiar, and we hesitate to venture into new territory. It is hard to let go of traditions, even when those traditions no longer bring life to a community.

And yet, sometimes it is those traditions that bring us life. Sometimes, it is an old hymn that sustains and enlivens us. Or the tradition of lighting candles at Christmas Eve which connects us with each other. Or joining in the Lord's Prayer together, knowing that this same prayer has been spoken for generations, which opens our hearts and minds.

The article by Bill Wilson encourages churches to find the balance between memory and imagination, to balance tradition and new ideas. He invites churches to be open to the work of the Spirit, whether the Spirit works through memory or imagination.

How are we living out of memory and imagination, and how can we more fully connect with God and each other through both? An interesting question as venture into the holiday seasons.

More from Les: Changes in Life's Direction (Part 1 of 3)

Our lives can be changed; not necessarily by the things that happen to us, but by how we respond. Let me give you an example from the early 1980's.

I served as Manager of Colony Development Operation from 1976 to 1980. My job objective was to keep our corporation's suspended commercial oil shale project in a state of readiness to reactivate readily if my employer, Atlantic Richfield Company (ARCO), and the other owner companies decided to do so.

My small group in Denver had been reasonably successful, and with rising world oil prices at that time, ARCO's management had decided to start preparing to reactivate commercial construction activities. The project commercialization staff was assembled, I was assigned an operations management function, and we began updating our contractor agreements and finishing the permitting process. It was an exciting time!

ARCO needed additional partners to share in the risk of this first-of-a-kind commercial venture and began making contacts. We quickly discovered that one possible partner, Exxon U.S.A. wanted not just to participate in the project, but to take it over entirely!

The sale to Exxon closed in October 1980. When the transition was nearly complete and Company division management decided to have a project going-away party as the project staff disbanded. We wanted to celebrate what had been accomplished even though another company would enjoy these fruits of our labor.

We reserved a private dining area at a local restaurant and invited all the ARCO Colony project employees and spouses/guests to the dinner. Jim, the newly named General Manager of the project would say something to congratulate those who had worked with Colony for the work done for the project; I agreed to reflect upon the history of ARCO's involvement in Colony. Our Division President, Ki Bond, was there since he had directed the company's joining Colony in 1969, as operator, and served as the first Manager of Colony Development Operation.

After dinner, the speeches began, but not as intended and there were several. Each one displayed a little more cynicism and bitter humor than the previous one. As I listened, I thought, "we are here to celebrate something that represents the best efforts and intentions by a small group of engineers, miners, environmentalists, and accountants over a twelve year period. We are not here to pick on Exxon!" We were grieving without admitting it. We all shared a sense of deep loss of something valuable but were not able to put words to that sense.

So, when I got up to speak, I began to thank people.

"Thanks to Ernie and Ki for the new mining techniques, thanks to Rich for the design of a retort sealing system, thanks to Jim for the air quality model, to our lawyers for following through on the EIS, and thanks to Walt for the Battlement Mesa community plan. Thanks to all of you who have contributed to making the Colony project as prepared as it is. You should feel good about what you have done.

After all, who else in today's industry can claim to have made a profit in Oil Shale; more importantly who else has netted over \$300 million from this business?

I join you in grieving about the loss of something, into which we all have put our hearts. But remember, this is not the last project we may take on, this is not an end, but a change in priorities. ARCO has more projects planned or going on going on than I have time to list and they are projects that require our expertise. So don't look back or think of what might have been with Colony, look forward and what can be in our future."

The room was quiet, then Jim started applauding, then everyone in the room stood up and continued clapping. I glanced toward Mr. Bond and think I saw tears in his eyes.

He leaned toward me and said quietly, "Thanks, Les, you said what I couldn't."

Little did I know then just how much was to come.

God bless my former co-workers and friends.

Trustees Corner

We appreciate the support from St. Luke's Trustees and their families, and from several Little School families and teachers, as we worked together on Saturday morning, October 7th to prep our playground for renovation work scheduled for completion during Fall Break. Our focus was to weed landscaping areas along the front and north sides, install new heavy duty weed barrier, and move woodchips from the western most playground to the front yard to try to prevent weeds. On the north side, we installed cobbles over new weed barrier. In the playground, we also moved sand out of both large sandboxes in preparation for the installation of new landscaping borders. In the backyard, volunteers painted the wood framing of our Playhouse. Our thanks to everyone who made time on a Saturday morning to come out and help with these projects, our grounds look so much better and we successfully reused materials otherwise destined for the landfill! We are most grateful!

The following week, our contractor renovated the three playgrounds. The old railroad tie borders were splintering, and they were replaced with composite ties that will last much longer. New mulch was added and now provides much more cushion when little ones fall. Gaps between the ties and fencing were also repaired. Check it out: they look like new playgrounds!

As we near the end of each year, teams begin the process of recruiting volunteers to serve for the upcoming years, working through the Equipping Ministries Team. Trustees encourage members and constituents of St. Luke's UMC who have knowledge/interest in building and asset management to consider serving on our team. Finding someone to make use of our old tables and chairs turned out to be a difficult task. After several weeks, we eventually posted our excess furniture inventory on Facebook. And we quickly got an answer and a family from New Mexico just picked all of the furniture up! They will be making good use of it for their growing church, Springvalley Fellowship. Good to help out a fellow congregation.

Jesus is our example of how we live into God's justice grounded in our faith. Jesus reminds us to love God, love neighbor and love self. Jesus teaches us to recognize his presence in all people. Jesus call us to compassion, forgiveness, and hope. Our Faith and Justice Team is excited to explore how we as individuals and as a community can live more fully into Jesus' teachings and work towards a new reality of God's justice in our world.

Our work is connected to the global work of the United Methodist Church through one of the General Board of Church and Society. "Church and Society is the agency within the Church that educates, advocates and connects in an effort to implement the Social Principles and other policy statements of The United Methodist Church. Continually advocating with policy makers, organizing the grassroots, and educating future leaders, Church and Society works to live faithfully, seek justice, and pursue peace." The board "works to fulfill the mandate of 1) relating the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the Church, communities, and the world in which they live; 2) bringing the whole of human life into conformity with the will of God, and 3) showing that reconciliation involves personal, social and civic righteousness."

Little School News: Our Remodeled Playground!

Have you stepped out back lately? If not, I highly encourage you to discover our remodeled playground. In a joint venture with the trustees, we gave the playground a facelift it desperately needed. We contracted a company called GoPlay, whose workers consist of certified playground inspectors and installers. While the snow made the first day a bit difficult, GoPlay was amazing, and

their work did not stop. They replaced all of the wood railroad ties with composite wood that will last long and not splinter. They moved the fences to better align with the sandboxes. They put in the required amount of wood chips according to state regulations for playgrounds. They replaced the sand in the sandboxes as needed. Our playground looks amazing! In the next year, we will be working on fundraising to replace the

largest play structure on the playground. It is showing natural wear and tear, and it is time for it to



be replaced. Play structures typically cost ~\$25,000. Keep an eye out for Little School fundraisers coming soon to help us update a space that the children who attend Sunday School and Little School all adore. Our playground is one of the happiest places at the church for our young ones. We would like to thank the Little School families who came to volunteer, trustees families, Sandi Thompson, Ken Fong, Sandi Miyaki,



and James Bacon for their dedication and time to the project. It takes a village to raise children, and boy, did our village show up to help!

Unfortunately, there are children in Africa that attend schools that do not have a functioning library or even textbooks for the children. Literacy is the foundation for learning and sustained development, what is a better way to develop literacy than through reading?

Our daughter, Brittany Grosse, was taken from us due to a senseless act of violence on Nov 30, 2012. Brittany was an avid reader; during her "down time", she was normally found with a book in her hand (or on her Nook). Brittany had a desire to help children, she was attending McNeese State University in Lake Charles LA to specialize in childhood psychology. Reading and helping children is a perfect way to honor Brittany's memory, and establishing a library in rural Africa is a great opportunity to keep her aspirations alive. This will be the First Annual Brittany's Book Drive for African Literacy, please help us in making this a success.

Brittany's Voice will be working with the African Library Project and Project Humanity to provide books to eager readers; we will be establishing a library for the Obolo Mixed Secondary School in Muhuru Bay, Kenya, Africa. Wellbeing & Gratitude

I love the month of November. Maybe it's because this season feels more reflective and I sometimes need to be reminded to slow my pace a bit and pay attention. November invites us inward and encourages us to pause, even if for just a while, to take inventory and to think and feel a little more deeply. I welcome the opportunity to go inward – to consider all that is good in my life. When I slow down a bit, I often find myself feeling grateful. And, as many know, gratitude can actually be transformative.

Giving thanks is one of the most powerful ways we experience restorative wellbeing and health of mind, body and spirit. Gratitude benefits us and it benefits others in our lives. Yes, I know. It seems so simple! Yet by reflecting on what we are grateful for, our lives become more meaningful, we begin to focus on wanting what we have rather than on having what we want and appreciation generates a whole cycle of kindness.

Robert Emmons, a professor of psychology at the University of California, Davis, is a pioneer in gratitude research. One of his research findings was that gratitude speaks to a deep human need to give and receive thanks. This interdependence of giving and receiving gratitude builds community and allows people to thrive. "There is a magnetic appeal to gratitude" (Emmons, 2013, *Gratitude Works!*). It benefits both the person who offers gratitude and the person who receives the expression of gratitude.

Further research indicates that our concerted practice of appreciating the good things in our lives may increase vitality, improve overall health and help us experience greater resilience. According to Time's Special Edition on Mindfulness (2017), researchers believe these things happen partially because gratitude can rewire our brains so that we become more attuned to the good things in our lives (Carter, Greater Good Science Center, University of California, Berkeley). One way to connect with our experiences of gratitude is by writing in a gratitude journal. Simply write freely about the people and things for which you are grateful. This practice helps us more fully embrace the importance of people and experiences in our lives. Once we have more awareness, sharing our appreciation with others is powerful.
